

Morning walk in the Emerald Necklace: Alan Banks, Senior Park Ranger, Frederick Law Olmsted National Historic Site, Brookline, MA, will guide our walk along the Riverway stretch of the Emerald Necklace, the six-mile long chain of parks linked by the wetland resources of the Muddy River. Frederick Law Olmsted, Sr., America's first landscape architect, designed the Emerald Necklace in the 1890s. Meet on the patio at 43 Hawes Street. We will set out directly across the street from the patio through the Longwood Mall, considered the oldest grove of European beech trees in America, circle back around Christ's Church, then head down to visit the "urban jewel."

THE CENTER FOR SCHOLARSHIP AND RESEARCH

Visit the display tracing the connection between Froebel's work and its influence on Lucy Wheelock as she created the vision and direction of what is today Wheelock College. The board tells the story. The locked case next to it contains original documents and, of course, a few "gifts."

As you move past the archival display, you will see two boards showing the development of a growing presence of "documentation" as a process and methodology at Wheelock. For the past three years, we have hosted Tiziana Filippini, Director of the Documentation and Educational Research Centre for infant toddler and preschools of the Instituzione in Reggio Emilia, Italy, as a visiting scholar and sent a group of faculty, students, and alumni there. Two displays, one by Wheelock faculty and students and the other by Boston Public School teachers illustrate this work.

VISIT WHEELOCK'S BOSTON CAMPUS

The Wheelock College Resource Center is an exciting workplace to explore, work and play with materials and technologies used in environments that support the growth and development of children and their families. Located on the Wheelock Boston Campus, Classroom Building, Lower Level, the Resource Center is open 9-5 on Wednesday and Thursday and 9-12 on Friday during the conference. Director Jeannie Blazer will welcome a visit from conference attendees.

Wheelock College Library located at 132 The Riverway is home to an extensive collection of archival and rare material by and about Friedrich Froebel. It includes rare books and journals, translations of material by Lucy Wheelock, and several sets of the Gifts and Occupations. The library has prepared a display of rare material in its public area. Due to the construction of a new student center and dormitory, you will not be able to view the Froebel Frieze over the main door, but you can see a picture of it on the display in the Center for Scholarship and Research.
